EIP-AGRI Workshop 'Tools for environmental farm performance'

Tuesday 7 February – Wednesday 8 February 2017 Zagreb, Croatia

On Tuesday 7 and Wednesday 8 February 2017, the European Commission's DG Agriculture and Rural Development – with the support of the Croatian Ministry of Agriculture – is organising an EIP-AGRI workshop in Zagreb. This workshop aims to stimulate the uptake of the broad range of sustainability tools involving environmental assessments that have already been developed and tested in various projects and initiatives by farmers. The workshop will also look for opportunities to promote innovation in this context.

The premise is that farmers may have an interest in working with tools providing information on the environmental sustainability of the farm or farm operations for the following reasons:

- 1) On-farm initiative direct interest:
 - a. Own initiative, independent from external or economic incentives
 - b. Synergies between economics and environment, mostly efficiency related
- 2) Food chain related:
 - a. Premia or condition for selling
- 3) Facilitating compliance with environmental legislation:
 - a. User-friendliness in compliance with regulation
 - b. Improvement of environmental performance of regulatory related actions, by awareness creation

The different categories relate the environmental assessment to different stakeholders. It is therefore a good opportunity to bring farmers together with developers and other users of sustainability tools to share and learn from their growing practical experience and thereby strengthen their benefits. EIP-AGRI Operational Groups, which are financed through the Rural Development Programmes 2014-2020, can bring together partners with complementary knowledge in innovative projects.

How to promote "usable" and "useful" environmental sustainability tools for farmers is the underlying question of the workshop, with a subsequent focus on the following issues:

- 1. To experience the diversity of environmental sustainability tools used in the different Member States / regions
- 2. To exchange practical experiences and lessons learnt about the specificities of each tool, showcasing their usability at farm, chain and agricultural system levels
- 3. To promote innovation in the ongoing development of environmental sustainability tools that match farmers' expectations and needs.
