# EIP-AGRI Seminar 'Promoting creativity and learning through agricultural knowledge systems and interactive innovation'

Thursday 3 December – Friday 4 December 2015 CityNorth Hotel, Gormanston, County Meath (near Dublin), Ireland

On 3-4 December 2015, DG AGRI is organizing a two day seminar dedicated to promoting understanding of Agricultural Knowledge and Innovation Systems (AKIS) and to highlighting practical examples of the changes taking place in approaches to knowledge exchange, learning and innovation in the agricultural, forestry and rural development sectors.

National / regional AKIS are evolving rapidly. The traditional, top-down linear model is increasingly outdated. Knowledge no longer flows from researchers, trainers and technical experts only. Mutual learning between practitioners and other key actors is increasingly important and new forms of media and information technology provide exciting new possibilities for working together and exchanging knowledge.

However the different parts of AKIS, including training/education, advice and research, face many challenges and are governed by different incentives which can hinder synergy and cooperation. New approaches and new tools take time to become fully established and need new skills to make wise and effective use of them. Language barriers exist and in many cases there are still gaps between research, advice and practice which block the two way flow of information/knowledge and limit the interaction between research and practice that is needed to foster innovative solutions to sectoral needs and opportunities.

We need to understand how farmers and other innovation actors create knowledge, where they get their information from and if their AKIS is providing sufficient incentives / opportunities for them to exchange knowledge, develop new ideas and support interactive learning and innovation. The Dublin seminar therefore has the following specific objectives:

- 1. To **develop our common understanding** of AKIS as diverse, flowing systems that are constantly evolving and creating new opportunities for effective knowledge exchange, learning and innovation;
- 2. To **promote** the concept of "interactive innovation" and how / where it fits into AKIS, highlighting especially the difference between the development of new ideas and the use of existing knowledge;
- 3. To **explore** how farmers and other innovation actors engage within AKIS and whether it meets their needs, and in doing so **highlight** areas / issues where the flow of information and knowledge needs to be improved;
- 4. To **raise awareness** of the new tools, approaches and perspectives being used to enhance knowledge exchange, learning and innovation in the agricultural, forestry and rural development sectors.
